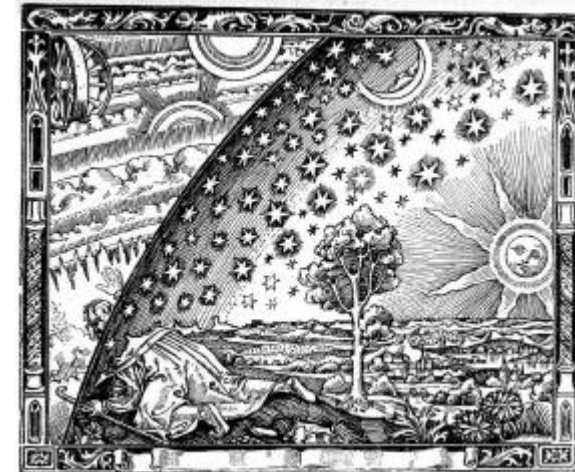

EARL MAGNUS  
ERLENDSSON of  
Norway (known as St  
Magnus of Orkney) and his  
cousin Haakon travelled with  
King Magnus Barelegs in  
1098 to raid the western  
islands of Scotland.

He refused to fight and stood  
on the prow of the longboat  
singing psalms, which did not  
endear him to the other  
Vikings. Whether he jumped  
or was pushed overboard is  
not recorded but he fled to  
Scotland.

After Barelegs was killed,  
Magnus returned to Norway  
to find Haakon had taken over  
his earldom, but he got it back  
by complaining to the  
Norwegian Thing.

When Magnus went to the  
court of King Henry I of  
England for a year, Haakon  
took over his earldom, but  
Magnus got it back by  
complaining to the Thing.

At an Easter reconciliation,  
Haakon arrived with eight  
warships and thus Magnus  
became a saint.

Died in 1116, patron of those  
in danger.

## Ane HUSBAND's Duties.
